## 2014/15 National Scheme annual report launched

The 2014/15 annual report: AHPRA and National Boards has been published.

The report details the work of the National Boards and AHPRA in implementing the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme over the 12 months to 30 June 2015.

There are now more than 637,218 health practitioners registered to practise in Australia, from 14 different professions, representing overall growth of 2.9% over the past year.

Occupational Therapy Board of Australia Presiding Member Ms Julie Brayshaw said assurance, challenge and improvement in proportionate regulation remained the focus for National Boards.

'As National Boards we strive to be a driving force for positive change and leadership in public safety and facilitating access to health services,' Ms Brayshaw said.

'Our efforts continue to identify a range of activities to improve patient safety and the quality of regulation for health professions. This report helps to inform the public and health practitioners how we meet our objectives and responsibilities on their behalf,' he said.

'Information about each of these registered health practitioners is easily available to the community through the national online register,' said Martin Fletcher, Chief Executive Officer of AHPRA.

'Maintaining an up to date national register is one of the most important ways in which we protect the public.'

For the occupational therapy profession, the report reveals that:

- 17,200 occupational therapists were registered at the end of June 2015, an increase of 6.0 per cent from the previous year
- 33 notifications (concerns/complaints) were received about occupational therapy registrants (excluding NSW where there is a co-regulatory system)<sup>1</sup>
- 36 notifications about occupational therapy registrants were closed by 30 June 2015
- of the 36 cases closed under the National Scheme, the Occupational Therapy Board of Australia determined:
  - to take no further action or that the case was to be handled by the relevant health complaints entity in the relevant state or territory in 26 cases
  - that conditions be imposed on an occupational therapy practitioner's registration in three cases
  - that cautions be issued in six cases, and
  - No cases resulted in cancellation or suspension of an occupational therapy registration.
- the Board continued its program of engagement and informing the profession with a number of successful breakfast forums and webinars, which a attracted more than 1000 participants
- the Board reduced practitioner fees, oversaw practitioner audits, and started a review of its profession-specific standards, and

• the Board engaged in regulatory decision-making workshops and started a project analysing practitioner notifications.
